The Council of Asian Pacific Americans (CAPA) is now accepting applications for its scholarship program for high school students who are Asian-Pacific Americans (APA). Aneesa I. Rashid, chairperson of CAPA's education committee, said that the deadline for submission of applications is October 28th.

Rashid requested CAPA officers and directors to "inform your school districts and communities regarding this excellent opportunity for high school students of APA heritage."

Students eligible for the scholarships are full-time high school seniors who will attend an institution in the State of Michigan and stay in Michigan. The eligible candidates for the scholarships must have APA heritage and should be willing to serve on CAPA's youth committee.

The eligible students are required to submit their applications on or before the deadline. The students who will pass the screening process will also attend an interview for the final selection. The interview is set on November 9, 2011. The decision of CAPA's award committee on will be granted the scholarships will be final.

E-Verify hurts Asian Americans

Warning aired on E-Verify impact on Asian workers

The Asian American Justice Center (AAJC) warns on the adverse impact of the proposed E-Verify, an electronic employment verification system, on Asian-American Pacific islanders (AAPI).

AAJC said the proposal mandating the use of E-Verify will hurt AAPI workers and place a major new regulatory burden on AAPIs who own small businesses.

The reason for this, AAJC said, is that naturalized citizens and foreign-born workers face significantly higher risk of database errors.



It noted that although steps have been taken to improve E-Verify's accuracy, tentative non-confirmations (TNCs) for authorized foreign-born legal workers remain unacceptably high.

It also observed that naturalized citizens are at least 30 times more likely than native-born citizens to be the subject of database error and legal non-immigrants are 50 times more likely.

AAJC said that the proposed mandatory use of E-Verify will create a new set of employment problems for the more than eight million foreign-born AAPI workers in the country.

Compared to records of US-born workers, foreign-born workers relying on Department of Homeland Security (DHS) records to prove their work authorization are at a greater risk of TNCs because their records are subject to ongoing updates and, consequently, recordkeeping delays, AAJC pointed out.

Furthermore, it said, recently naturalized citizens may not be aware they are required to notify the Social Security Administration (SSA) of the change in their citizenship status, which can result in SSA database errors.

Record inaccuracies can stem from inconsistencies in recording names, AAJC said, noting that this type of errors is usually made when dealing with longer surnames, the use of multiple surnames and name order associated with foreign names.

These name nuances can lead to confusion of DHS personnel recording the information. It can also confuse potential employers

during the employment verification process.

AAJC reported that in fiscal year 2009, 22,512 TNCs resulted from name mismatches. Based on estimates by USCIS and SSA, the E-Verify requirement for new hires nationwide would generate yearly some 164,000 name-related TNCs.

AAJC pointed out that high database-error rates result in adverse employment actions against AAPI workers.

It noted a Westat report that "E-Verify contributes to post-hiring discrimination against foreign-born workers because foreign-born workers with employment authorization are more likely to receive incorrect TNCs."

FILAMMCO launches fund drive for victims of typhoons Pedring, Quiel

Becky Tungol appeals to kind hearts for cash donations - The Filamcco Foundation, the charity arm of the Filipino-American Community Council (FILAMCCO), has launched a fund-raising campaign that will help provide relief to the thousands of victims of two recent typhoons in the Philippines.

Filamcco Foundation President Becky Tungol is appealing in behalf of the victims for donations in cash (checks) for the Typhoons Pedring and Quiel Fund, which will be turned over to the Sagip Kapamilya-Typhoon Pedring, a fund drive launched by ABS-CBN TV network for the same purpose.

Tungol said the donors' checks should be payable to the Filamcco Foundation and sent to Filamcco Foundation, 17356

Northland Park Court, Southfield, MI 48075.

To kick off the fund campaign, FILAMCCO Foundation immediately donated \$1,000 to the Typhoons Pedring and Quiel Fund. Michigan Circulo Pampangueno headed by President Tony Kho also donated \$200, while NANAY (National Alliance to Nurture the Aged and the Young) gave \$100.

Earlier, Gina Lopez, president of the ABS CBN Foundation, emailed to Filamcco Foundation President Tungol a letter appealing for fund donations for the benefit of the typhoon victims. In her letter dated Sept. 29, 2011, Lopez stated that typhoon Pedring devastated at least 48 areas in the Philippines "from as far north as Isabela, Aurora and Ilocos all the way to Metropolitan Manila."

Lopez said that as of last Sept. 29, the death toll was 21 with at least 35 persons missing. More than 325,000 people are dislocated, and some 80,000 victims, including many children, are housed in evacuation centers, she reported.

She said, "Our local weather bureau has reported that typhoon Pedring is stronger and more ferocious than typhoon Ondoy. Worse, a second typhoon (Quiel) is expected to hit the same areas by Saturday (October 1, 2011)."

Lopez appealed to Filamcco Foundation, "ABS CBN Foundation had sought your assistance many times in the past, and you had never failed us. I hope I can count on your help again."

She said, "The rescue and relief efforts continue as I write. We are providing food, medicines,



kerosene lamps, blankets, bottled water and other supplies at the evacuation centers. We are also

addressing the special needs of expectant mothers and young children.”

She added, “We promise to use your donation wisely and carefully to help as many people as possible at this time of need.” It was recalled that in 2009, the Filamcco Foundation also conducted a fund-raising drive for the victims of typhoon Ondoy. Tony Kho, who is then FILAMCCO president, reported that the Filamcco Foundation turned over the collected funds amounting to more than \$27,000 to the ABS CBN Foundation.
